Being unified in purpose, in spite of our differences... Living in harmony even when we disagree... These are not new concepts. The early church struggled with the same apparent dichotomy. First Corinthians 12 sees Paul counselling his readers on this very issue. "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ." (v 12)

We all have different backgrounds. In Christ though, we are one. As were the Jews and Gentiles, the slave and the free.

We all have different understandings of issues that may divide us. As did the early church over unclean foods and circumcision, to name two. In Christ though, we can still be united.

Give Us...? Devotional

We cannot under estimate the power of prayer.

Jesus told us to pray. He taught us how.

As a people of God, we need to be unified. As this world comes to a close, we will need it even more...

So unite together in prayer...

Jesus' model prayer is so well known we can recite it by heart. We've learnt a lot from the Lord's prayer.

After focusing on the Father, praying for God's kingdom to come and for His will to be done, the prayer continues, "Give us this day our daily bread." (Matthew 6:11) Now what do you think Jesus had in mind? Just bread? Bread and jam? Daily provisions? Or is it possible that He was talking about relying on the Father for what really matters - trusting God as provider rather than fretting and being anxious? Maybe.

Just a few verses after the Lord's prayer, we find Jesus saying, "do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or drink.... But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness." (Matthew 6:25) Then Jesus assures us, "Ask and it will be given to you...." God gives good gifts to His children. So it seems clear that Jesus underlying message was to trust - to rely on the Father, to turn to Him in prayer and experience peace knowing that God is in control and will provide for our needs. Let's face it, He even gave His only son - for us. (Matt 7: 7 - 11, James 1:17, Romans 8:32)

So how often will we pray? What will we pray for? And how will we deepen our reliance on Him?

I heard a story of a travelling

evangelist. He had success wherever he went with large numbers people joining the church. He was in demand. He loved his work and church leaders wanted him to run his programs in their districts.

At this point, some have probably started reaching for their phone to ask, "Who is this guy? Can we get him to come to our community?"

Wait - there's more to the story.

Months before the evangelist arrived, a retired pastor would go to the town or suburb where the meetings were to be run with one purpose - to pray. Not just once but right up until the program started - and even more so as it continued. He prayed at home. He prayed at church. He prayed with others. He prayed on his own. Can you imagine what he prayed about? He walked the streets praying for the people. He prayed for the leaders of the town or city. He prayed that the people would come to the meetings. He prayed for the team doing the preparation. He prayed for the guidance of the Holy Spirit.... He prayed, as the Bible says, "without ceasing," and his prayers were answered as new people were introduced to Jesus and joined the church.

The secret of the evangelist's success? God's blessing in response to prayer.

I'm so thankful that so many Adventists in Victoria are 'praying people.' More than 1000 have joined me as prayer partners, praying for our church in Victoria every day - and they're just the ones I know about. Our church needs God's guidance every step of the way. We need Him to open the way. We need His blessing in so many ways. So what's on your prayer list? Here are just a couple of big picture items I'm praying for:

The World Church: General Conference leaders have asked for 100 days of prayer. The General Conference Session is from 2 - 11 July 2015. The business session of our world church only happens each five years. A couple of thousand delegates will make decisions about many things that effect the mission and practices of the world church - and there's strong feeling about some issues. So let's pray that God will guide delegates as they vote, and that He will protect His church from the forces that would divide it if they could.

Our Denominational Leaders: Leaders will be chosen at the General Conference Session, not just for the GC, but also for each Division of the

world field - including our South Pacific Division. Then, in September, the Australian Union Conference Constituency Meeting will be convened Melbourne. I'm sure you're as eager as I am that God has His hand over the selection of leaders who will set directions for the future of His church. And I've had many people assure me that they're praying for our conference leaders on a daily basis - thanks so much. If ever we needed prayer support, we need it now!

Our Pastors: Are you praying for your pastor and their family? Did you know that growing churches are praying for their pastor. It's true. We have a wonderful pastoral team - all human, all of us with faults and limitations, yet all committed and working to build up the body of Christ. Would you join me in praying for our pastors?

Our Mission: I'm sure you're aware of the evangelistic work in Victoria this year. A lot has been done to connect with community people. Soon the message we love so dearly will be presented in its fullness. There's so much to be thankful for - and we're seeking prayer support.

Unity: I'm very much aware that the enemy seeks to divide and conquer. Jesus made this a matter of prayer. "I pray that they may all be one; even as You, Father, are in Me and I in You,

that they also may be in Us, so the world may believe that You sent Me." (John 17:21) Our mission is clear. Our message is certain. So let us fix our eyes on Jesus rather than on the faults of one another and pray that we may be one, as Jesus did.

So many have chosen to be prayerful people, so as we pray, let's increase our trust in the Father. Let's pray for His kingdom to come. Let's take to Him the things that concern us, and ask for His name to be glorified, and that people will come to know Him. Let's pray without ceasing.

We Are Community

Unity does not universally equate with uniformity.

As a community, there will be many differences. These need not divide us if we keep Jesus as our centre...

Arthur was part of my home church. He seemed old when I was a child and he just got older over time. He lived on a sparse diet and it showed. He would have been tall but for a small hump between his shoulders that bowed his slight frame.

He was somewhat eccentric. An introvert, he rarely initiated conversations. I can't remember him laughing but he wasn't unhappy, he was just serious. He didn't drive for years so church families took turns in getting him to and from church and church events.

For the 20 years I was a regular attender at my home church, he was just there. As teens, we considered him a little strange. But he had earned

enough respect that we rarely made fun of him.

I think the respect came from the fact he was serious about his Christianity and his Adventism. And it showed. He was devoted to the Scriptures and the writings of Ellen White, and quoted both. And, if he was critical of what we young people were doing, we never knew of it.

Over the years, I would see him at church on the occasions when I returned "home." We would exchange greetings and brief conversations, but that was about it. We weren't close, but when he died about 10 years ago, I was surprised at how sad I felt. We were so different, yet we had connected.

We, the community

Arthur and I belonged to the same small community called the Seventh-day Adventist church in Kadina, SA. That was our connection. But we also belonged to this larger community called the Seventh-day Adventist Church—a worldwide movement.

That was particularly important when we met in a small rented and musky hall in town before we had our own building. We felt insignificant, but knowing we were part of something bigger—a worldwide community—meant we could stand tall, even if we could see little success in our local endeavours.

The word "community" implies both similarities and differences. The similarities found within show what we have in common—they are what make us a "common-unity" (a good definition of community). The differences we have to those outside help us understand who we are compared to them.

These similarities within and differences without build a boundary around us that gives us our identity. It helps us to know who we are.

A message and a mission

In every community there is diversity. Arthur and I were different in so many ways, but what united us was bigger than both of us, and we were both playing a part in it. You will find the same in your congregation.

The doctrinal positions we take help define us as a community. The Sabbath not only unites us, but also marks a difference from most other Christian groups. The Second Coming is in our name and is our ultimate hope. The Sabbath and the Second Coming, with the three other "s"-word doctrines—sanctuary, state of the dead and Spirit of Prophecy (the writings of Ellen White)—are core beliefs that draw us together and build our sense of community.

We were launched on the wave of prophetic excitement surrounding the prediction of Jesus' return in 1844. Prophecy remains an important part of who we are. The books of Daniel and Revelation, particularly the three angels' messages, with their apocalyptic scenarios are of special interest as they point to the end-times and the Second Coming. Because of this, we live in anticipation of Jesus' return.

Our message is an end-time message as we await our Lord. It's a message

Hughesdale Church



A Precious gift Longwarry Church

You may remember the story we shared last year, of Longwarry's desire to reach out to their local Aboriginal community (<http://intravic.adventistconnect.org> and search *Just to be Heard*). As a result of their involvement in local events during NAIDOC week last July, connections were made which have led to the following story...

Two members of the Drouin-Warragul Aboriginal community, upon returning from a relative's funeral in Darwin, were talking with some members of the Longwarry Adventist Church, who told them about the CHIP Programme our church offers, that teaches ways to improve heart health, lower blood pressure, and improve diabetes, among other things. Interested, one of the ladies looked it up on the internet and liked what she saw.

The final result of this conversation? Well, there isn't one yet, the story keeps growing...

Longwarry Church, together with the Aboriginal community, helped organise sponsorship from the local Shire to conduct the Drouin-Warragul Aboriginal CHIP Programme. This was held at the Longwarry Church during February and March, 2015.

"The program for the indigenous people went very well," Sibilla Johnson, who facilitated the program, tells us. "We have developed a good friendship with the community and they expressed their sincere thanks to the Adventist

church for helping them see and understand a better way of eating and living."

Fifteen members and their families attended the opening programme. Following the first set of blood tests, a number were found to have highly at-risk lipid profiles, four were diabetic and one pre-diabetic, and eight were extremely over weight.

At the graduation a participant who had previously been diagnosed diabetic achieved normal blood sugars. While all participants lost weight, one in particular lost 26kg and the skin of another, who suffered from psoriasis, became condition free.

"The CHIP ministry has opened the door into this community," continues Sibilla. "Two of the women, who are elders, have now undertaken CHIP facilitators training and will be taking our health message back to the people within their community."

This gift from God keeps on giving...

we began with and it will remain until Jesus returns. There is no other hope for our world.

We also have a mission to get the message out. This happens with personal and public witness and evangelism in various forms. We even run health programs and people helping projects through our churches (or ADRA) from a desire to help people live a more fulfilling life. But there's always the prayer that they will also create an interest in more—in the spiritual life.

The message and mission are a significant part of what makes us unique and they form a solid base for a community that is bigger than the individuals within. In fact, the diversity within actually strengthens our community as each of us brings our own strengths and giftedness to broaden our impact.

A reminder: Our uniqueness is not found in our recognition of Jesus as Lord and Saviour because there are a myriad of churches and groups that also claim that. It comes mainly from our understanding of our message and mission. However, we need to remember that if Jesus is not our absolute centre we fail to be a community built on Him.

Unity and uniformity

Unity is also important, but it isn't uniformity. Uniformity would mean little thinking or creativity within. It would mean denying the skills and giftedness we have, and the Spirit's leading in lives.

The current discussion about the ordination of women is causing some

excitement, but it illustrates well the unity-uniformity difference. You and I may not be uniform on this and have different opinions. Both of us will be able to quote Scripture to defend our positions. This can divide us, but only if we choose to let it. Our unity is not threatened by what is not a core teaching, unless we allow it.

When a decision is made about the ordination of women later this year—whatever it is—there will be disappointment from some. Anger, even. That's the time to be gracious as a real community, embrace each other and return unitedly to the main game. We have a kingdom to build, a God-given mission and a destiny to fulfil for Him. These are the unchangeable, the non-negotiable.

The love factor

In Frank Kirkpatrick's book *Community*, he suggests that there is a progression as true community develops. The first stage is people connecting with each other. The second is those individuals serving the organisation they have formed. The third is relating "through intentional love for each other." That's when the community really blossoms.

Our little congregation was stunned when Arthur arrived at church one Sabbath with a woman on his arm. She was probably about 30 and quite attractive. I guess he was a couple of decades older, but I was in my teens at the time and he always looked old to me.

I remember how the women of our church fussed over her. They wanted her to feel welcome. That happens in a healthy community. They supported

Arthur and they supported his friend. Intentional love does that.

They married. Unfortunately, the marriage only lasted a few years. She just wasn't there one Sabbath. In fact, she'd left the area. That's when the church gathered around Arthur and held him close. Like you do when a member of your community is in pain. They wanted to support Arthur. Love does that.

For our church communities, love is a Jesus-commanded imperative (John 13:34, 35).

Arthur has the last word

As I was writing this, I Googled Arthur's name and was surprised to find he'd had a letter published in Adelaide's *The Advertiser* (December, 1953). He had written mainly against horseracing, but also other sports that had "degenerated into schools of brutality."

He wrote: "If all the energy dissipated in ball games were applied to industrious labour, and all the money expended was dispensed to succour genuine needs the nation would incalculably benefit." I could hear his voice as I read this.

He finished: "A pertinent question might be, 'What would Jesus do?'" I smiled and wondered how the reader would have felt about a letter on sport that ended with the WWJD question. But knowing Arthur, he would ask that because it fitted who he was. Jesus was at the centre of his life.

And that's another reminder that Jesus must be central to our community, or we miss the point of what we are about—and whose we are.

Sharing God

Waking up on Sunday morning to the sound of rain is never good when you are going on an excursion! Even so, I was excited... although nervous. Would I do a good job representing ADRA and interacting with all the refugee families from the Migrant Information Centre?

As we rocked up to the Conference office just after 9am, it was hard not to think that the day could be better if it were sunny, but we decided to make the most of it and pray for a good day. Volunteers were introduced to the newly settled refugees, we prayed together and then all 53 of us jumped into two buses and a car and set off in convoy. Destination: Phillip Island.

In my bus, we played Heads Up, which is an app on the phone. You pick a category and hold the phone to your forehead. Everyone else can see what is written, they shout and mime and you have to guess to win points. The best part of the game is that it records everyone. Definitely a game for all ages!

Ordaining Justin Ordination

Just before Big Camp this year, Justin Bone was ordained. Currently working with the Ararat, Stawell and Hamilton churches, Justin is well known in Melbourne too, where he worked with Wantirna Church and Nunawading Christian College, not to mention his work with the Upper Primary group at Big Camp and many travelled to Ararat to be part of this special event.

Justin grew up in a Catholic family in a rural NSW town. God was at best a distant friend who might like him, or who, at worst was an angry figure needing to be placated by prayer. Justin sought fulfilment in self-gratification and of course found none. He was aimless, going from one job to another: Waiter, Hotel Reception, and Call Centre work in Customer service.

Then Justin met a girl who told him something strange about the days of the week and the Sabbath. The girl in question happened to be the daughter of an Adventist Pastor, and had promised herself she would never marry a minister...

It occurred to Justin that if he had been wrong about the Sabbath, maybe he was wrong about God. His curiosity triggered, Justin attended Net'99 at Parramatta Church. He was interested but needed to know more.

After moving to Queensland, Justin studied for two years with Pr Mark Wilson, who worked with him patiently. Finally, in 2002, Justin was baptised at Edens Landing.

Then he married the girl!

A couple of years later Justin felt a call to go to Avondale to study for ministry. A number of church members started taking him aside and encouraging him to enter ministry. At first, he rejected the calling and encouragement. His wife knew what it would mean to

answer that calling and they weren't ready to take that step.

Justin's pastor had always said that Avondale was to be avoided, so he felt it wasn't for him. Together Justin and Vanessa prayed for weeks before finally taking it to the pastor. To his shock and surprise, the pastor told Justin that he thought he should attend Avondale and pursue ministry, before Justin could even share his thoughts with him!

So they submitted to what God was bringing into their lives and applied for a place in the Theology degree. Justin was quickly accepted and within a month, they'd sold their house and car and had moved from Brisbane to Cooranbong. Justin studied from 2006 to 2009 and graduated with distinction before being picked up by the Victorian Conference.

Looking back, Justin can see that God was preparing him through all his experiences to serve others and to minister to their needs. He still expresses surprise that God called him, but he knows that God did. Justin said yes to God once, and it is his intention to keep saying yes to God whenever He calls.

Congratulations, Justin and Vanessa. May you continue to be aware of the Lord as He walks beside you in your life of ministry to Him.

- Two courtyards with sensory boards, a bus shelter, a men's shed, clothes line and raised garden beds - these features are incorporated in the lifestyle programs for the residents;
- Murals and artwork of Victorian landmarks which provide a point of interest along the walking tracks.

Our dedicated staff are committed to delivering quality care and services to meet the specialised needs of our residents with dementia, helping make their lives as fulfilling as possible.

Greetings.

For those of you who were able to attend, I am sure you will agree that Big Camp 2015 was a success. We had a good attendance and God blessed us with great weather, fellowship and times of worship. Mark Easter 2016 on your calendar – and plan to be with us for Big Camp next year.

While 2014 was the year designated as the year of evangelism with a major focus on urban areas, already 2015 is shaping up to being even busier than last, which is wonderful news. Local pastors are implementing the cycle of evangelism within their churches. Within our pastoral districts, pastors are pooling resources as they work with their churches. The Literature Evangelists have brought in a record 400 Beyond contacts which is a challenge for our Preston church members in particular, though other churches are involved also. We are thankful for all the faithful work our people are doing across Victoria. Please continue praying for these efforts.

One of the most effective ways to care for the relational needs of our church is adequate training of personnel. Thus March saw a 'Basic Counselling Skills' workshop for pastors held at the Conference, with Drs Bryan Craig and Trafford Fischer. A marriage enrichment event is planned for later in the year.

With the approach of the AUC Constituency Meeting in September, we were pleased to be able to complete the quota of delegates, and we thank those who have accepted their nomination.

Being committed to doing what we can to protect our children, we have made the decision that, in keeping with requirements at our local church level, even our Conference Committee members will have Working with Children checks – all readily agreed to this.

The Camp Howqua team are doing a great job managing the facility. The committee recognises the importance of keeping our facilities up to date, so a number of requests from Howqua have

been approved, including a generator, the final stage of the kitchen upgrade and Frisbee golf.

Our conference team are also doing a great job and the reports from the Communications Department showed that in the last 18 months there have been more than 61,000 views of on-line video available on our conference TV website. Well done Sherrie Courtney and Mirek Stekla!

Mrs Danijela Trajkov presented an excellent report of her work as Women's Ministries director. We know how much this ministry is appreciated. Thanks Danijela.

Our Samoan church plants have both grown and multiplied. The Church Company at Melton has now been approved by the conference committee to function as a church, and the recommendation to the next constituency meeting will be for the Melton Church to join the sisterhood of churches as an officially recognised Seventh-day Adventist Church. We look forward to continued effectiveness as they reach out to community people.

The Victorian Conference is the 3rd largest in Australia yet has the highest numerical growth rate. We have significantly less staff working in our conference office than other comparable conferences, and more pastoral staff caring for churches. There continues to be a commitment to supporting local church pastors as well as providing support and resources for local churches from the conference.

While we have plenty of challenges we thank God for His blessings -- we have so much for which to be thankful!

Six Reasons Sexual Predators Target Churches

Safe Places

On Guard is a book by Deepak Reju looking at Abuse within our church. Tim Challies reviewed this book and came up with six reasons sexual predators target churches. Read a summary of what he has to say...

1. Christians are perceived as naïve – guard is lowered when amongst professing Christians and offenders know this and flock to faith communities
2. Christians are thought to be ignorant of the problem of abuse and its extent within the faith community, thus failing to take adequate measures and ignoring warning signs
3. Churches offer easy access to children and predators, knowing a church's need for volunteers in its many programs, show up eager to make themselves known and ready to serve
4. Christians are taught submission to authority, but not taught that there are times authority should be defied – people in positions

of spiritual authority are often afforded trust because of their position, bypassing normal cautionary measures

5. Churches offer roles that put abusers in the 'right place' and a religious language that can be manipulated... "This is not sin, but love" from the lips of the class teacher...
6. Christians forgive – abusers count on receiving grace far too freely and with little cost. They are not dumb and know that a few tears and the right words will appeal to the Christian ethos of forgiveness...

No wonder the Bible says to be 'wise as serpents and innocent as doves' (Matt 10:16).
