Does your mind hit snooze the minute you hear the word Discipleship? What does the word mean, and is it perhaps just a phase? Fads come and go, leaving little to show for it, except perhaps nostalgia. The Adventist church has done its best keeping up with the fads... slide projectors in the 70's, satellite seminars in the 90"s... As texts give way to tweets, door-knocking is losing ground to discipleship. Almost every new initiative, poster, flier, vimeo or facebook post or broadcast from official church channels sings the anthem of discipleship. But what is Discipleship?

Two thousand years ago, discipleship was not a fad, but a way of life. It remained so for almost 1800 years until the industrial revolution spawned education into an assembly line for the masses.

The Greek origin of Disciple did not mean a follower of Jesus. It was a

common word commonly used for the common apprentice in a common trade, profession or philosophy.

In case you blinked, it was common. The apprentice journey was an endless cycle of the master invites a protégé to follow, the protégé apprentices to the master, the master trains the apprentice, the apprentice becomes the master... and we are back at the beginning.

An apprentice or intern is synonymous with the biblical disciple. There is no magic or mystery to the word which is why it needed no explanation or definition in the Gospels. The locals knew what it meant.

Today it may be a trending buzzword in church circles but it should be as

common as Weet-bix and hay stacks! It is something that our children should associate with normal everyday life. It is a culture new believers should experience as natural, when they encounter Jesus. Finally it is the heart of Jesus' Great Commission. Go and make disciples.

Why? In a nutshell, life is better and eternity a possibility, with Jesus. Disciple-making involves the same basic elements that the common apprenticeship (discipleship) involved 2000 years ago, whether learning to fish for sardines or souls.

How do we reclaim the lost art of discipleship?

Follow Jesus

To make disciples who in turn, make

Follow Jesus, be an authentic friend, invite your friends to follow you.

other disciples, we must first have some knowledge, experience and success in the Christian journey. You need to know how to use a fishing line before teaching someone else to do so. This by no means implies having attained perfection. But it does involve continual daily steps toward a closer relationship with Jesus.

A person can begin making disciples as soon as they take that first step with Jesus. Simply inviting others to walk with them, one step at a time. Keep stepping forward with Jesus in your spiritual, personal life, family study or work life. Ask God each day how you can know, experience and share Him more.

Be Authentic

Who will you invite to follow you? This is one of the biggest challenges we face in our church and community when it comes to discipleship. We don't know anyone... much. Why would strangers follow someone they don't know?

You are not going to catch any fish if you are not at, by or in the water.

We will never make disciples if we are not genuine in our relationships with fellow church members and others. It is through authentic interactions with our friends that they will see Christ in us and want to know more. Spend time doing things you like with those who like them too. Find reasons to celebrate, eat and share life together. Authentic, effective lasting Biblical discipleship occurs in doing life together. From that starting point, friendship and trust develops. And from that point of commonality, our faith experiences can bless others.

Invite Others

An experienced minister once told a young person considering pastoral ministry not to answer if he wasn't called. While not all are called to full time paid ministry, all ARE called to

discipleship. The only problem is for most of us the call to discipleship gets lost in the spam folder, our minds auto-filtering it as junk mail.

Jesus was focused ("Yes Peter, I mean you!"), He was direct ("Follow me!") and He was clear ("I will make you fishers of men") in making disciples. And after taking one step with Jesus, we are equipped to invite someone to join us, to follow us, to come fishing with us. But remain focused and clear. Be intentional about mentoring a young person in your church. Offer to support and be an accountability partner for a new believer in their devotional life. Take church members with you to visit and pray for each other. Pray with a non-believer going through difficult times. Invite non-Adventist friends to experience a Sabbath with you, or to share a healthy home cooked meal with you.

And all the while bring your children, youth and fellow believers on the discipleship journey with you.

Apprenticeships or internships are not passing fads but a part of every day life – as should be discipleship.

Follow Jesus, be an authentic friend, invite your friends to follow you.

Why? Anywhere with Jesus is better than everything without.

What will you do today to share your faith with others?

The Australian Conference has recently changed its long standing vision statement from being a church that Knows, Experiences and Shares our hope in Christ, to being a Thriving Disciple Making Movement. We asked them to expand on this vision further

Afraid of losing momentum, the early Seventhday Adventist movement resisted forming an official structure for almost two decades. Reflecting on past protestant movements-turnedinstitutions, our pioneers vowed to avoid any structure inhibiting the march of present truth towards Zion.

But with a relatively stagnant net growth, have the fears of our forbearers materialised, at least in the Australian Seventh-day Adventist Church? A church better known for our breakfast foods than our soul food? And if so, can the tide be reversed?

Earlier this year at the AUC Executive meetings, pastors and lay leaders from around Australia committed to lead the church in becoming a 'thriving, disciple making movement'. However

throughout Christian history, it is not committee motions that have fuelled growth but the indwelling work of the Holy Spirit moving through willing vessels

Campaigns and conventions, papers and programs, resources and restructures all have their place and value, but none come close to what God can do through committed Seventh-day Adventists in their local church and community context.

What will it take to become a thriving, disciple-making movement once more? Communion, relationships and mission.

Communion with God

Zero – zilch – nada – nothing – that is our guaranteed mission success rate if we do not have a thriving, growing experience with Jesus each day (John 15:5). God has no need or desire for us to finish His work, rather He longs to finish His work in and through us. To do so we must have constant and continuous communion with Jesus.

Read your Bible and pray every day is' more than a children's song – it is the essential blueprint for communion with divinity. Are you daily spending time in communing with God through prayer and Bible discovery? Are you listening and cooperating with that still small voice as you go about your day? Before fixing our families, our churches, our structures, our communities, we should be reaching up for a deeper communion with God, each day allowing Him to work in us so He can work through us.

Relationships with others

We often imagine Jesus came to save us 'from sin' (Matthew 1: 21) but this generally translates to Jesus saving us from doing the 'wrong' thing.

Did Jesus simply live and die to save us from doing bad, dumb, harmful stuff? Or is there more?

According to the Apostle John, "sin" is 'breaking the law' (1 John 3:4). Jesus explains that the law is essentially an imperative to love God and others (Matthew 22:38-40).

So, by deduction, sin is the act of not

loving God and others. Jesus died to restore us to loving God and others.

Put another way, Jesus lived, died, and rose again so we can have healthy, vibrant, loving relationships with Himself and those around us.

He died to restore us to positive relationships, not merely to cleanse us from past wrongs.

How are your relationships? How would your spouse, children, parents, friends, church members, colleagues, bosses, neighbours or strangers driving on the same road describe you? Do your family members aspire to have your faith and character? What is your relationship like with your brothers and

sisters at church? How many young people in your local church see you as a role model?

How good is the news we are sharing if it does not have the power to restore us to loving relationships with those around us? Disciple-making is not merely a proclamation of truth but a personification of loving relationships. After all, Jesus called us to make disciples, followers, imitators of Him, and He is love – God "with" us.

Ask God for love, wisdom, strength to reach in to those around you that the world may truly know we are disciples of Jesus by our love for one another.

Mission Movement

"The difference between an institution and a movement is that one crosses boundaries, the other guards them" (David Bosch, Transforming Mission, 50). Why does the Seventh-day Adventist Church exist? It is not to defend, protect or convey truth – God is more than capable to do that for Himself. Just look at the Bible

defended, protected and conveyed through generations no thanks to us and our relatively new movement.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church exists to demonstrate the love and power of God in redeeming and restoring humanity to happiness, health and holiness [Matthew 5:14-16].

We cannot be a movement if we don't move. Move out of homes and into our neighbourhoods, out of our churches and into our communities, out of our comfort zones and into the war zone of the greatest controversy in history. How many non-Adventist friends do you have? How many new non-Adventist friends are you regularly making? How much time do you spend actively being in (but not of) the world?

'Disciple making' is living and showing an experience so much better than what others have that they become jealous of and yearning for it.

But how will the world ever be jealous of what we have if they don't see it? Hiding behind a computer screen, garden fence or church perimeter engenders no envy.

Follow in Jesus' footsteps. Leave home and go mingle with people where they are, make friends, eat together, and when asked tell others what Jesus has done for you – repeat again and again and again. As you place yourself in places and spaces in need of divine light, God will shine in and through you to reach out to his children still in darkness. He will impress you with loving actions, healing words, genuine sympathy at the right time, in the right way to draw others to you first and ultimately to Himself.

The question we should be asking ourselves is not whether or not the Seventh-day Adventist church is still a movement. We should be asking whether or not we, as individuals, are still moving?

Are we moving closer to God, closer to our fellow believers, and closer to our communities? The sum is greater than the parts – the church will move and be a movement as each one of us commits to move in our spheres of influence.





Changing Lives

On Sunday September 24th, five students from Tasmania, who incidentally had never left the state before, embarked on a trip to Vanuatu! Three of these students were from Eastside Lutheran College.

They joined with five people from Victoria, a further seven from South Australia and two from Western Australia

Their mission was to work together with local builders to support the establishment of a staff house at the Loukaru Adventist Primary School on Tanna Island . This house was for the principal who had been living in the school library for the past eight years.

Throughout the trip the team learnt how the students walked to school. many for over two hours, to receive an education. They were shocked that clean water was sometimes three km or more away from the villages and learnt how since 2016, ADRA Vanuatu has helped establish clean water to 25 different project sites in the provinces of Penama and Sanma.





The team also saw the devastation still evident from Cyclone Pam which destroyed buildings and crops back in 2915, and its impact on the livelihoods of the villagers.

One student commented that, "We have so much in Australia and yet still complain."

Through the daily worships people shared how true resilience in times of hardship comes from a relationship with Jesus. How, to be like Him, we must be kind, generous, grateful, humble. And how we must understand that everyone is made in the image of God regardless of economic, mental, physical and/or social status.

On the last day, two students shared how they wanted to know more about Jesus and requested baptismal studies - praise God.




