## **A Simple Truth**

The words were a bit indistinct, but with a bit of concentration and careful listening, I recognised the tune and the words of the song that drifted gently down the hallway. "Jesus loves me," she sang, "this I know..." as she did whatever else was really important for a two year old to do.

I'm guessing you too know the song she sang. It captures the simple truth that's at the heart of Adventism – the Gospel message.

As Adventists, we're a people of prophecy. We have the blessed hope of Jesus return. We've learned to worship on Sabbath. We know about the sanctuary and other beautiful doctrines we hold dear. And the Gospel message is central to each and every one of them. It's central to Adventist identity.

The three angels' messages start with a reminder of the simple truth captured in that song that even two year olds love to sing. "Then I saw another angel flying in the midst of heaven, having the everlasting Gospel to preach to those who dwell on the earth."

A friend reminded me just the other day that the three angels' messages are truly about righteousness by faith – and that is good news.

That's what doctrine means - teaching. It involves beliefs. Now the simple truth is that you can't have Jesus without belief, teaching or doctrine. It would be possible to have beliefs or doctrines without Jesus. What a tragedy that would be.

Rightly taught, Jesus is at the centre of every belief held dear by Seventh-day Adventists.

Thank God for our wonderful Saviour! Thank God for Christ-centred, Bible-based beliefs. Thank God for truth simple enough for a two year old to begin to understand, yet deep enough for scholars to keep studying for years.



# God's Megaphone

# A devotional on who we are....

So you are an Adventist

What does that mean? Who are you and what defines you?

More than twenty million people from every walk of life call themselves Seventh-day Adventists. Standing side-by-side, with our arms outstretched and hands joined, we could form a globe-circling human chain reaching from Melbourne to Auckland to Santiago to Buenos Aires to Johannesburg to Perth and, with this year's baptisms included, right back to Melbourne!

From the poorest of the poor to multi-billionaires, from people on life-support machines to Olympic athletes, Adventists wear every skin colour known and worship God in more than 900 languages. We are as multicultural and diversely assorted as any group of people on earth, yet we are also one — or at least we try to be.

Our unity is found in Jesus Christ, the One who prayed in John chapter 17 that His followers would also be 'one'. He wants us to be united in joy (v.13), in mission (v.18) in truth (v. 14, 17, 19), in witness (v.20), in glory (v.22) and in love (v.26).

More than sixty years after that prayer Jesus spoke again, through John the Revelator, clearly revealing that the Seventh-day Adventist movement which began in the 1800s is a prophetically appointed, 'Last Days' remnant people, raised up by God for such a time as this.¹ No other movement or denomination on the planet today can make this same Biblically true claim.

But what exactly has God raised us up for? Do we really have a unique calling that is different to other Christian denominations who also share the gospel? The Bible's answer is 'Yes, absolutely.'

Like Noah, Elijah and John the Baptist we have been assigned one of the most exciting missions ever. We are the forerunners — those appointed to announce the soon coming King. And what's our cry? Well, in its purest form the Three Angels' Messages of Revelation 14 loudly announce "The greatest rescue event in the history of our planet is soon to take place. Be ready!" The original Greek words describing the 'loud voice' with which these messages are given is basically megaphone. That's us, God's megaphone of love!

The Adventist movement has been entrusted with the task, the privilege, of being used by the Holy Spirit to tell the world. We are called to announce Christ's return not just theologically and doctrinally, though these are absolutely integral and essential to our message, but holistically through loving acts of kindness, one-to-one sharing, evangelistic campaigns, media ministries, centres of influence, humanitarian service, schools, hospitals and the list goes on.

John the Baptist prepared the way of the Lord by announcing the soon coming of Jesus, calling people to repentance and helping them to prepare their hearts and characters for Jesus' arrival. So too today, those who 'keep the commandments of God', 'have the testimony of Jesus Christ' and 'the faith of Jesus' have been elected—by grace and grace alone—to be the forerunners who loudly and clearly announce the soon arrival of Jesus the second time.

As Adventists, God has gifted us with a deep understanding of 'the prophetic word confirmed' and the absolute certainty that we are living in the last days of earth's history. However knowing this truth and being convicted of it is just the beginning of our calling, not the end. We are called to take the everlasting Gospel, in the framework of the Three Angels' Messages, to the whole world.<sup>4</sup>

As I visit with Adventists across the globe I am encouraged and inspired by the reports and testimonies I hear.

For example, eating lunch with a

couple in New Zealand who googled their way into the Adventist faith while watching and checking the claims of television ministries like Hope Channel and Amazing Facts.

Or praying all night with hundreds of young adults in the Philippines as they humbly pled for the Holy Spirit and the courage to be missionaries.

And learning that Adventist World Radio is the largest foreign language supplier to iTunes with more than 17.5 million podcast downloads per day — and the most popular messages listened to are in Chinese and Arabic!

Or hearing of untrained lay people prayerfully running hundreds of evangelistic meetings where tens of thousands gave their hearts to God.

The Saviour wants to work through us... yes, even us!

As crazy as it might sound, He has chosen us as His megaphone...

And listening to the testimony of a European professional who sold everything he owned, except his bicycle, and went to serve the Lord in North Korea.

So many stories like that of my own family, who were loved into Christ by an ordinary person who chose to share the extraordinary message of our sooncoming Jesus with us.

The Bible describes God's end-time front-line troops, His remnant-gathering people, in many ways. They keep the commandments of God' and have the testimony of Jesus. They're also described as 'pure', 'enduring', 'patient' and 'faithful'. Is that us? Really? Yes, well... sort of.

How easy it would be to become proud and feel smug or superior as we ponder these glowing descriptions of God's prophetically appointed, endtime people. Fortunately, but sadly, the Bible also accurately describes us as 'poor, miserable, blind and naked', 'sleeping' and totally unable to purify, sanctify, unite or heal ourselves—a people in desperate need of a Saviour. Yes, that's us.

The good news, the absolutely incredible news, is that there is a Saviour and He wants to work through us — even us! — to try to save every person on the planet. As crazy as it might sound, the God of the Universe has personally chosen you and I to be His megaphone of love and grace as we announce Jesus' soon return, the greatest rescue event in the history of our planet.

I am, you are, we are, the Seventh-day Adventist church is, God's remnant-gathering people. But let us never forget that we, like the Jewish Christians in Paul's day, are only a 'remnant according to the election of grace.' That's us, 'elected by grace', not by anything we have done. Just amazing grace!

Let's truly live and share God's love and grace—boldly, extravagantly, tirelessly, loudly—every day in every way until He comes to rescue all His faithful people. It won't be long.

Imagine knowing one of the greatest predictors of long term commitment to Christian values was within your reach, attainable, and lived in your family! Imagine the peace you would feel, knowing you were doing what was necessary to raise spiritually secure young adults.

There is such a predictor, and while information does not automatically guarantee activation, I would like to share some handles on how make practical use of this predictor.

It is service. It is a spirit of generosity with time and resources. It is seeing and meeting the needs of others. And as the Conference Assistant Stewardship Coordinator, I encourage you to work to make this the very identity of your children.

#### Grow Faith through Service

Daron Pratt uncovers significant research in his leaflet entitled 40 Ways Your Family Can Serve Your World\*. He shows that service and faith development are inextricably linked. Practices of generosity strongly correlate with spiritual growth. They make children less self-centred, more involved and committed to their church.

Key elements to the successful transition of service into spiritual commitment included parental involvement, especially when combined with debriefing about service projects they have done together, and significant mentors, particularly as children get older. So singles, aunties, uncles, Sabbath School teachers and youth leaders, that means you too!

Personally, when I was involved in Adventist University students' service projects, I witnessed first-hand an extra fulfilment and camaraderie develop among us compared to that which develops with mere entertainment driven activities. Service creates significant and meaningful connections and memories.

While referencing the end time (which is us - here and now), Peter exhorts his readers to love one another and use their gifts (our gifts) as good stewards of the grace of God in its many forms (1 Peter 4:7-10).

#### **Nurturing our Gifts**

What does grace look like in your family? How does it work? With the presence of the Holy Spirit in our homes, our natural and spiritual gifts will be empowered and evident. Do you have a highly social child that loves to have people over to your house? Or even a shy one that has been taught not to think about themselves but concentrate on making that visitor at Sabbath school comfortable? Do you scan the church hall for the new faces or those that might have needs you could meet? We should all intentionally increase our perception of those around us, but do you have a family member showing signs of a budding spiritual gift of hospitality or mercy, that you could nurture and empower? How can you band together as a team, complementing each other's strengths to serve in such a way

that will give wind to your spiritual sails rather than drain you all?

Experimenting and seeking to understand each other's talents is a great place to start.

#### The Value of Money

Having a self-denial box is an idea recently presented in the Kindergarten Lesson on the Widow's Mite, but the concept has a much older history -Ellen White was keen that every family have one! She suggested encouraging our kids to put money in them rather than buying candy or trinkets (Child Guidance, 132), but failing that, we could have them match what they spend on treats for missions. They may be surprised how much they have spent on themselves at the end of the year! Or to make offering time meaningful you could encourage your children to take their own offerings out of their earnings (Adventist Home, p.

When I was a teen I had a "Religious Purposes Fund" for funding my passions - sponsoring cataract surgery and an orphan (along with my siblings), and for spiritual books for birthdays/ Christmas or flowers for those who needed something to brighten their day! It became a joy, as a poor university student, knowing that I had a designated amount already set aside to spend on personal outreach.

Have you ever wondered how to motivate the youthful not to leave clothes lying on the floor? Here's an idea I'm going to try. Something Ellen also thought about – letting my kids keep an account of 'their' money – what they get and what they spend it on. Money from us, but then as they earn, that can be factored in, and they are responsible for budgeting for their own clothes, books and other entertainment and whatever other expenses we think should be included. Ellen believed

that such a process would teach youth the value of money and the difference between true economy and miserliness (Ed. 238) and, I am hoping, that clothes are an investment worth picking up off the floor!

#### Layers of Stewardship

Last year my husband preached a sermon that included the story of the Prodigal, during which a Muslim gave his heart to Christ. Later, reflecting on what happened, my son incredulously said "Mum, there wasn't anything in that sermon to touch someone's heart?!" When I mentioned the love of the father, he said "Oh, suppose so." Yet that had been his Sabbath school story the very week before.

Sometimes kids can breeze over a story 'they know' and miss the spiritual significance, the many layers to the story.

Do we intentionally bridge that gap, helping them gain additional practical insights such as not being wasteful, encouraging them to actively search for deeper meaning to the stories?

Teaching financial principles to a preschooler does not involve getting bogged down on percentages... but we can teach that we give first – maybe with a special purse for Sabbath, we save next – perhaps with a piggy-bank, and spend last, with a spend wallet to take when shopping. This gives a foundation to build on.

When I was giving my primary schoolaged boys practice counting out a tenth, we had an interesting exchange. I explained that while we return tithe, all 'our' money is God's and we are simply His stewards. I wish I'd captured on video the looks of dismay that came over their faces. "That means we have to be careful what we spend all of it on!" one exclaimed.

#### Mission Motivates

A take home message I got from a presentation made by the Youth Department was that youth want to make a difference in their world. Despite often looking apathetic and disengaged, if we can only show them how they can reach out practically, service will become part of their very identity.

So start now. Connecting the dots between a child's offering and what it can achieve, service wise, can be as simple as jumping on line to pick something your daughter thinks is cool to 'buy' for ADRA. My son enjoyed picking out chickens, a water purifier and seeds for a farmer with the help of his friends at his birthday party, where, instead of receiving heaps of plastic junk for presents, we had a money tree. Half the money was for him to buy something he really wanted, and half went to ADRA. And wow, people were generous!

So being a steward of the grace of God, can be fun, bonding and meaningful. Whatever combination of Time, Talents, and Treasure your family has, reach out - be the eyes and hands of Jesus in your community. Then Total Member Involvement won't be a strategy up at the General Conference, but the way young people in your sphere of influence are being formed into the image of Jesus.

We had assistance from community members who donated their time to help provide these services. There was a wonderful



attitude of thankfulness from everyone and we acknowledged God as the giver of all wonderful things.

Happy Hearts continues to run every Tuesday morning during school term, where community children enjoy making crafts, hearing Bible stories, singing and playing. Lasting connections are being made with the families, allowing further opportunity for sharing God's love.

In June we commenced our regular Health series. The first meeting discussed high blood pressure and heart disease. The topics covered included the many reasons why people suffer from these conditions. After each presentation, we share food related to that session's topic and a cooking demonstration. This series

runs for many weeks and covers a wide range of health topics.

YVC is also involved in a monthly soup kitchen, where needy people from the local area enjoy food and a special time with our members, who come along to talk with them and open the Bible to them. Many volunteers make this outreach possible and we feel it is a God-given opportunity to open a door to many lonely and disadvantaged people.

God is working in our church, providing many services through dedicated Church folk volunteering and working together, empowering these programs to be well received by those who attend. He richly blesses our efforts and we can only pray for God to reach every heart in surrender to Him.

Little did I know...

Oh no, my purse! Gone. All my cards, the watch... The money!

"Please God, help me to find it," I prayed as I went over my tracks back to the Bank and the Post Office, to my car and the public conveniences. But it was nowhere to be seen.

I made my way to the cafe where my friend Jeanie was waiting. After telling her what had happened, she immediately opened her purse and gave me \$20.

"Thank you, but I'll be OK," I said.

"Let me do something for you," pleaded Jeanie, who has terminal cancer. How could I refuse?

I cancelled my cards and reported it to the police. Without evidence the purse had been stolen, there was nothing they could do. So I checked at the Post Office to see if they would look at the Security Camera footage – and there I was walking out with my purse in my hand.

"Not my birthday today is it?" I joked, before exclaiming "It's my purse!" I hurriedly unwrapped it and there it was, my green 'made in Italy' purse, carefully wrapped in bubble wrap.

"Thank you God." I hesitated to open it. Yes, the money was gone. More than I should have carried with me. Cards were all there, my watch too, and even small change. I notified the police who said that the person who sent it would have found it after money was taken and purse thrown away. I wrote a note thanking the person for my parcel, and asked the Postmaster if he would put it in the window. I hope he did

Jeanie was so excited when I told her her faith is growing and she had prayed specifically for the purse and watch. She was thrilled God had heard her prayer.

I decided to share my story because of what happened next: when I rang to get a new seniors card I told my story with the man on the other end of the phone and was taken back by his reply. money in my purse and that is true. (Another valuable lesson learnt!)





# Conference News

# **A Church History Lesson**

Earlier this year, in my capacity as Conference Secretary, I was asked to undertake research into the beginnings of the Victorian Conference, for what is the single biggest project ever attempted by the Seventh-day Adventist Church – the online Encyclopedia of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

While the enormity of the task did not enthuse me, digging through old dusty files of Executive Committee minutes and reading hundreds of historical articles for hours on end, but within a short time I found myself being drawn in to the world of the 19th Century.

In 1884, the annual session of the General Conference voted to start a mission in Australia and within six months, S. N. Haskell, J. O. Corliss & family, and M. C. Israel & family, Henry Scott, and W. Arnold set sail on a 29 day voyage, choosing to settle in Melbourne.

The small team found themselves facing many obstacles and strong opposition. Yet despite this, people identifying as Seventh-day Adventists in Victoria have grown from zero in 1885 to 11,114 in 2018.

The determination of these early missionaries is revealed in a statement found in one of their early publications. "A number of inquiries have reached us of late regarding our object in coming to this country, and how long we expect to remain. We are happy to announce that we came here to see the truths of the Third Angel's Message [See Rev. 14:9-12] established in these parts, and expect to remain until that work is accomplished."

Our early pioneers, guided by God, used a number of successful strategies to share the Gospel.

Media: By January 1886, just six months after arriving, their very first publication was being distributed – the Bible Echo And Signs Of The Times. This was initially a 16-page monthly journal, that focused largely on the distinctive teachings of the Sabbath and Second-Coming. During the first three months of the publication of the paper about four hundred paying subscribers were obtained, and many thousands of copies were sold.

By 1888 the potential in the use of print

media was so clear that US\$25,000 was invested in building and establishing the Echo Publishing House. It its time it was one of the biggest and best known publishing firms in Melbourne with 80 employees. You can walk past the building still, at 16 Best Street North Fitzrov.

Public Evangelism: To complement the use of media, evangelistic tent meetings were held and at their conclusion, a church established and the tent moved elsewhere to start anew. Thus North Fitzroy church was formed on 10 January 1886 with 29 members, and within a short time this number had increased to about 100. This was soon followed by the organisation of the church in Ballarat with 21 members, in the same year.

The World Exposition was in Melbourne in 1888, and this was seen as a great opportunity to be able to set up a booth in the 'United States Court.' The booth was constantly attended throughout with the hope to awaken an interest in the minds of tens of thousands of visitors, by giving out many thousand pages of literature, including about 12,000 copies of the BIBLE ECHO.

**Organisation:** Work progressed quickly and efficiently throughout Australia and the Australian Conference was formed in 1888, and followed twelve years later by the formation of other conferences. January 1, 1900 saw our conference taking on its current name, having been part of the Central Australian Conference previously.

**Education:** With the encouragement of the General Conference, on July 21 1892, it was voted to open a school at 1 George's Terrace, St Kilda Rd, Melbourne. First day of class was Wednesday, August 24, with 25 students present. Keynote speakers at the schools official opening included G. B. Starr, A. G. Daniells, E. G. White and W. C. White.

The school offered two streams: Grades 1-4, and Biblical courses.

The Australian Union took over responsibility for the school on 22 January 1894, and made the decision to cease operations in September 1894, with the intent to commence a training school in central location for the benefit of all Australia. Thus the school was moved to Cooranbong and became known as Avondale. From this start, primary and secondary education has continued to flourish in Victoria, with a 2,400 students in our schools in 2018.

**Health:** Until the decision was made to establish the Sanitarium in Cooranbong, which was formally established in August 1898, a team in Victoria had leased a bakery premises in Northcote, manufacturing several lines of health foods.

#### Big Camp

In January 1894, a different type of tent meeting was held - the equivalent of 'Big Camp' today. The three week camp-meeting was held at Middle Brighton, and was the first meeting of its kind ever held by Seventh-day Adventists in Australia. It included a workers' meeting and Mrs White was the keynote speaker. The Bible Echo (Vol 9, 1894 No. 3 page 21) stated, "Sr. White's talks have been most excellent, as they always are. She urges the people to prepare for the end, and says she has not come to Australia to fold her hands, or to give a peace-andsafety cry."

Conclusion: As early as 1888 it was reported that the work in Australia was self-supporting. The missionaries and their converts were faithful, hard working people, who were using the cutting edge technology and methodologies of their time to share the everlasting gospel. The story of the early beginnings of our Conference inspires me to consider how to also use the cutting edge technology and methodologies of our day to complete the work that was so well started. It is my hope and belief that as we work together with the Harvest Victoria initiative through the use of modern forms of media that we will see many more people given opportunity to respond to the everlasting gospel.

### 2018 YPW Retreat

Imagine being part of a church that values their youth so much that they are willing to pay and train young leaders to do ministry instead of having that part time job at Macca's or wherever!

Did you know the churches in Victoria, in partnership with the Conference, employ more than 20 Youth Pastoral Workers (YPW's) in churches around Victoria.

These YPW's gathered together for a dedicated YPW retreat in the first weekend in May. The retreat was organised by the Ministerial Association and supported by VicYouth and other presenters. The YPW's learnt more about sharing your faith, their role, how to give Bible Studies, better manage their multiple tasks and set goals as well as various aspects of youth ministry.

YPW's are youth who want to make a difference in their church, and they do. They impact their peers for Christ, they gain a taste of ministry and become the leaders we need. They are supported by their local church and mentored, like apprentices, by their local pastor and other local leaders. These young people choose to engage with church life at a time when many are tempted to disengage. With local support these YPW's run small groups, seek out other young people to visit, preach, plan, pray and lead in their local church.

Churches can apply for Conference support and have 1/3 of the employment cost sponsored by the Conference if approved.

Ministerial Secretary, Pr Darren Croft, says "Never underestimate what a young person, committed to God, can do when they are encouraged and supported by their local church."

### **LEs at Work**


People are curious, and God is working on their hearts, even if they don't realise it – As Anna Schlegel discovers repeatedly in her Literature Evangelist work.



# Introducing Victoria's Two Newest Church Companies

In June, two new Church Companies were recognised by the Executive Committee, Bendigo Karen Company and Bundoora Company.

The Bendigo Company commenced as a small group in 2010 with just eleven members who were attending the Bendigo Church. Today under the leadership of their minister Eh Paung, they have more than 70 members.

Many migrants settle in this rural city, and with an estimated 1700 Karen people now living in the region, the new company is very well situated to be able to minister to these new Australian residents.

The Bundoora Company is a global mission sponsored project that has been led by Pr Vikram Panchal. Ground work commenced in early 2017, and the group began worshipping in October of that year. They are currently meeting with an attendance of about 35 people on the perimeter of the La Trobe University campus, allowing

direct access to the University students while also being connected to the local community - Bundoora intersects three Melbourne Councils and thus the choice of this name reflects this company's missional desire to serve not only the university communities (La Trobe and RMIT) but the surrounding suburbs too.

The Executive Committee was very pleased to be able to recognize the two companies, along with their potential growth and ministry they will provide. Indeed, one of the best and most effective ways of growing God's Church is through the planting of new churches, so if you feel God's Spirit prompting you to plant a new church we would love to support you in doing so.

# Local Church Websites: Simple Church to Adventist Place


Adventist Media's new website creator, Adventist Place, is now available for use throughout the South Pacific Division (SPD).




Adventist Place is a simplified and modernised alternative to the netAdventist website platform the SPD hosted and supported between 2007-2017.



## A Few Short Years...

Our Schools - pro active in teaching our childen who they are in Christ...

The tiny baby didn't have a great start in life. From the time he was born. there was immediate fear. How were Amram and Jochebed meant to keep a little boisterous baby so quiet the Egyptians would not find him? Those who are parents know that babies cry at the most inconvenient times and places. What a task for Jochebed!

Well, the rest is history. After the Princess finds Moses in a reed basket, woven with love and lined with pitch and tar, Moses is returned to his home under the care of his parents and with the permission of the Princess of Egypt. The family no doubt rejoiced... until the enormity of the task ahead sank in. They only had a few years to share their heritage, their belief system and values before their baby would join the royal Egyptian household.

High on Jochebed's list would have been teaching as much as possible about Moses' identity. From the web site 'Kids Matter" is this quote "Having a strong cultural identity enhances children's self-concept and promotes a sense of connectedness and belonging. Children's cultural identity is nurtured when they learn about their own cultural traditions and when those around them show respect for their cultural values. Teaching children to respect and appreciate variations and differences between cultures is therefore very important for all children's social development."

While not their parents, we, as primary teachers, have up to about the age of twelve to shape the children in our care. It is an important time. Like parents, we need to teach manners, problem solving, compassion and life skills as well as the 'Three R's'. We



opportunity of teaching our cultural identity.

Now, at an Adventist school, our cultural identity is our love for God and encouraging each child to reach their full God-inspired potential. We teach values, Encounter and link emotional and spiritual IQ concepts in many

We have up until the age of twelve.

From his entering the palace somewhere around the age of twelve, fast track to when Moses is about 80 and beginning to realize his emotional, spiritual and cultural heritage. He listens to the Voice in the bush as God speaks to him. He talks about his insecurities and is encouraged with the words "I am who I am." God identifies Himself as "the God of his father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob" and Moses recognizes these names and obeys. It's a long time but Amram and Jochebed's hard work is beginning to bear fruit!

As teachers, we may never know the impact our teaching has on our children. Sometimes we are blessed to be able to follow children's lives as they become adults. But there will times when we just do not know.

# STEM - blast off!

STEM - it's the new buzz word in education - heard of it?

STEM education and training covers the specific knowledge and skills found in the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics disciplines. It also covers the interrelationship between these areas, allowing learning to be delivered in an integrated way, promoting a deeper engagement in the four disciplines.

In May, Henderson College hosted their third inter-school STEM challenge involving 70 Grade 6 students from ten schools within the district. This year the theme was Mission to Mars, with students focusing on designing, building and launching rockets, including a transport vehicle.

STEM Teacher, Fiona Hudson, said "We wanted to create an authentic experience for the kids based on real life scenarios. Students were required to create a rocket that could launch and return while keeping a raw egg safe, as well as a robot powered vehicle used to transport the rocket."

Teams members were required to each take on the role of either the accountant, chief engineer or technician. They were provided with a budget to buy items from the STEM shop. The winning team won four mini robots for their school, similar to the robots students used to power their transport vehicles.

"It was all about teamwork, problem solving and engineering, and we had a fantastic day," Ms Hudson said.

Members from Traralgon Adventist Church and Moe joined with community and council members - Deputy Lord Mayor Dan Clancey and Member for Morwell - Russell Northe to open the new garden. Thank you to Gavin Chatelier for your inspiring music and for making everyone feel so welcome.

The Traralgon Seventh-day Adventist church building is placed in the lower-socio economic part of town. The closest school, Liddiard Road Primary School provides breakfast for its students 4 days a week because children come to school hungry, with church members volunteering for the program. They wanted, however, to do more for their community and a garden gets you outdoors and working together builds friendships.

In April, Foodbank released its first ever research report on child hunger in Australia, entitled Rumbling Tummies. The report exposed the shocking statistic that 1 in 5 children are living in food insecure households, and that a child is more likely to go hungry than an adult in Australia today.

This community garden will strive to address these issues. It will be a socially inclusive space, where all people will feel welcomed and supported. The garden will help to build community and intergenerational connection, provide a learning environment, promote creativity and art and provide much needed fresh produce to support people in need.

#### Vikram Panchal

Finding God in a country like India would be a challenge, if God we not behind the search.

Vikram was born into a Hindu family in Mumbai, a city of 23 million people. A city that never sleeps, in a country with 22 official languages that takes religious and cultural diversity to a new level. Unexpectedly, his father decided to send Vikram to a non-denominational Christian boarding school and so he was just seven when he first heard about Jesus, and gave his life to Him. It was also while he was there that Vikram's parents went through an extended and bitter divorce that dragged on until Vikram moved to Australia for his tertiary studies.

He soon lost interest in religion and God, telling Him one night that he would no longer pray to Him and to leave him alone. In his effort to outrun a God he could not forget, Vikram became lonely and depressed.

God intervened on an unforgettable train ride home one night after

University classes, when He directed a young man to start up a conversation with Vikram. Through a series of coincidences, invitations, wrong phone numbers and chance encounters, the two became friends. Vikram was introduced to an older friend, who turned out to be an Adventist.

He craved the peace he saw in their lives... feeling he would give anything to have it himself. All his life he had been searching for meaning. Separated from his family and desperate to find an identity, he longed for love, acceptance and to be a part of a family again.

One day, the older friend told Vikram that he would become a Seventh-day Adventist too, and would go on to study at an Adventist institution and enter full-time ministry. This angered Vikram – someone telling him what he would do. He was planning to be a business man. He thought to himself "Glad you told me. Now I know exactly what NOT to do!"

With a busy work and study schedule, Vikram lost touch with his friend. Four years later, graduated and unable to



find work in his chosen career, Vikram reached a crisis point: unemployed,he was applying for and travelling anywhere in Australia looking for work... but nothing. His life was uncertain and chaotic, and one day, coming home after another unsuccessful interview, he broke down crying. "God, if you exist, I need you now," he cried and immediately his Adventist friend came to mind, with an impression of God telling him if he wanted answers, find that friend.

Eventually, in 2006, Vikram was baptised. By then he had an excellent job with good prospects, but that night he began to feel God's pull toward ministry. The following year he surrendered to God's call to ministry, and to what he thought would be a life of uncertainty.

Vikram worked as a Bible Worker before studying at Andrews University and returning to Victoria in full-time ministry. He married Leah, who had also been a Bible Worker at Gateway in the past, and together they form a strong team for ministry.

In retrospect, Vikram says he would not change a thing! God provided financially while studying theology overseas. He says that what he gave up, God has replaced in far greater measure. Clearly God opened doors and gave experiences he could never have had otherwise, had he stayed in his previous career.

Vikram's desire now is to fulfil God's calling to be a labourer in God's harvest in accordance with Matthew 9:37-38 "The harvest truly is plenteous but the labourers are few. Pray ye therefore to the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth labourers into His harvest." He has been working with Gateway since 2012 and Preston Church and Latrobe University church plant since 2017.

In May, joined by church family and friends, Vikram was ordained as a pastor.

#### Roy Kim

The next month, friends and family again gathered for an ordination – this time for Roy Kim who has worked

with the Gateway, The Orchard, North Fitzroy, Northpoint and Melbourne City Churches and in University ministry.

Roy grew up in an Adventist home where family worship was a priority. The family sacrificed much to give Roy and his brother an Adventist education but ironically, it was while attending a secular University, he gave his life to Jesus. At the end of his second year at university, with the encouragement of a pastor who had been an incredible support for Roy and his family during the difficult years following his mother's death, he decided to take a break from his course and go to Mission College of Evangelism . Roy settled in to the program, which consisted of Bible worker and evangelism training. Students went door to door, conducted bible studies, organised a health fair in preparation for a later evangelistic series... and to Roy's surprise, he and his outreach partners had three of their contacts decide to be baptised. By the end of this experience his sense of identity as an Adventist was strong and he continued on the Bible Worker path. With his father's consent this led him on a four and a half year journey, traveling to different parts of the world and working on several different evangelistic efforts. In 2005, Roy began working as a Bible worker for Gateway, and in 2007 training and coordinating the Bible workers for the Mark Finley evangelistic series.

But still, Roy resisted the call to ministry, due to fear of failure, finances and family cultural pressure towards fields of work other than ministry. However at 24 years of age, while hearing a sermon at AYC 2007 from a visiting

speaker, a sermon incidentally, he had heard many

had heard many

times at Mission College, he knew God really was prompting him towards ministry and he responded.



And his fears were laid to rest. In answer to prayer he received sponsorship to study at Andrews University in 2008. It was post GFC, fees were high and money was scarce yet he didn't have to worry about finances. It was during his studies that he also met Jinha. They pastored a student church together, complementing each other's strengths. They married and prayed that God would give them opportunity to work in ministry together. God answered, and through a series of circumstances, both Roy and Jinha were offered full time employment in the Victorian Conference in 2012, including planting a new church together.

Roy's journey in ministry has been a faith-building experience of witnessing God's leading in various ways through various people. Roy greatly appreciates the unique opportunities he has been given, the good mentors, and his wife as a partner in ministry. When asked if he could do anything he wanted what would he be doing, his response was "There isn't anything else I'd rather be doing."

you are right there with Esther in the palace in Persia. You can really imagine the life of Esther during the ups and downs of her life. You are there.






#### Siggy & Flori

Victoria is a middle-aged woman who has existed with clinically diagnosed severe, treatment resistant depression for over ten years, during which time, her life dismal and horizon filled with dark, hopeless clouds, she had endeavoured to end it six times. Her physician, an Adventist, recommended she attend Nedley Depression and Anxiety Recovery Program, known as DARP in our Conference. She came, it worked and she's free! Here's her story...

When Victoria presented to the community-based educational program, the initial Depression and Anxiety Assessment Test (DAAT) confirmed her symptoms were severe, showed her several causal factors (known as "hits") and laid out a path to address them. She later described how the program helped her with "comprehensive testing, a knowledge of the causes of depression and what to do about it." In short, DARP and the people who journeyed alongside Victoria empowered her to believe that change was possible and within her reach. She read through both books on cognitive behavioural therapy (CBT) that accompany the program - a stellar accomplishment for anyone struggling as she was. She embraced the lifestyle recommendations, steadily integrating them into her routines. She was particularly attune to her body's need for good nutrition and a consistent sleep pattern.

Within eight weeks, her symptoms plummeted by 90% from "severe" to "mild/non-existent". Her emotional intelligence, which measures a person's ability to identify and manage their emotions, climbed 34%.

When I saw her at the graduation service, I could see freedom and freshness beaming from her face. Her father, her biggest cheerleader throughout the ordeal, was there and said, "This has changed her life!" She is now sharing with her friends, family and even her therapist the amazing impact this experience has had on her well-being.

Victoria plans to attend our DARP Training in July so she can help others through the dark clouds to the sunlight above.

There were others with similarly desperate situations that experienced transformation. A young lady was diving deep in depression, crying repeatedly without cause and not tracking well in day-to-day living. Another young mum was desperately trying to find a way out, flying home overseas for treatment options which repeatedly ended in dead ends. One student wanted better ways of coping with the strain of university life and the social challenges of being in a foreign country. Another man wanted release from the saddening doubts that consumed his personal, relational and professional life. These are real people and each came through with a new lease on life.

Having worked with DARP for over ten years, I have seen many, like Victoria, come back from the brink. Last year I attended Dr Nedley's residential DARP as a professional observer. What the community-based program takes eight weeks to accomplish, they do even more thoroughly within ten days. I literally saw miracles! One teenage girl arrived and was a social recluse - wouldn't smile, was extremely fearful and anxious and suffered repeated panic attacks. She had been abused by her father, didn't trust people – especially men – and was without hope. Within a week of treatment, God broke through the layers of fear, sleeplessness, resentment and isolation. She smiled, she shared, she hugged. She healed and found in Christ one who she could wholly trust. By the end of the program she openly "adopted" one of the male staff as a spiritual dad!

Over 40 people have been trained in



DARP in the Victorian Conference in the last 36 months. Four churches ran programs this year alone. There is interest in making it available in our schools where there is a great need. The gem of the program is its comprehensive whole person focus.

"You can see the difference it is making", a participant commented. "Having attended three graduation services in the past month, I saw people's lives changed one after another." Not to mention the impact the program had on her own life.

I wonder if there are any Victoria's in your community. If the Gary's and Jenny's living next door are waiting for a similar invite. If you and your church want to invest in this powerful ministry, let me encourage you to send at least three people to be equipped to provide this in your community. One needs to enrol as an Associate Director and the other two as Facilitators. The training and materials are the same, but the Associate Director has the responsibility of running the program and owns the DVD's, while the Facilitator manages the table discussion.

Proverbs 12:25 (NKJV) says, "Anxiety in the heart of man causes depression, But a good word makes it glad." Do you know someone anxious and depressed? There is a "good word" you can share that can encourage them to lean on the Master Healer and find release from the tyranny of despair and the confines of doubt. Jesus was sent to "heal the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed." Luke 4:18
