

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One of the surprising paradoxes of life is that possessions do not make one happy. In fact, those focused on acquiring more 'stuff' tend to be less satisfied with their lives and display greater unhappiness than those who have far less.

Travelling through Africa, the smiling faces of the children remind one that you can have very little yet still be very happy. What then determines happiness?

The Harvard Medical School recently published a paper with the intriguing title: "Giving thanks can make you happier." When we acknowledge the good gifts we receive it connects us to something larger than ourselves - such as other people or God. Interestingly, the word gratitude has its origin in the Latin word gratia, which means grace, graciousness, or gratefulness, thereby linking it to the abundant provision God has made for us. In essence, it refers to being thankful for something received and acknowledging that all good gifts come from our Father's hand. But can something as simple as expressing thankfulness or gratitude make a difference to our level of happiness?

Psychological research has shown that experiencing and expressing gratitude is strongly and consistently associated with greater happiness. Saying thank you, paying others the compliment of noticing and commending them on doing something worthwhile, writing a letter of gratitude to a mentor, making a point of never letting an opportunity pass to pay tribute to someone's good points, these are all ways of enhancing our own happiness. There is no doubt that gratitude helps people experience more positive emotions and pay closer attention to the good things that happen to them. Focusing on blessings received improves health outcomes, develops greater resilience, and builds strong relationships. But does gratitude do anything for the spiritual aspect of our lives?

Paul admonishes us to 'give thanks in everything' (Philippians 4:4) and

to 'rejoice in the Lord, always' (1) Thessalonians 5:18). This is not always easy. In fact, to find good in the midst of bad and blessing in the midst of stress takes practice. It does not come naturally to most of us. Yet, giving thanks is the first step towards praise and worship and cultivating an attitude of gratitude is an important part of our spiritual development. What does the practice of offering thankfulness and praise to God do for us?

Surrender our expectations...
Give up our desire fully understand...
Let go of our need to control... and praise Him

It has been my experience that when I focus on my problems rather than on the presence of God, I struggle to experience the sense of peace and joy that Jesus promised: 'I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full' (John 10:10). But when I choose to focus on praise and expressing gratitude to God for His abundant provision for my life, my attitude shifts and the Son breaks through the clouds of worry. I have found that nothing lifts my spirits more quickly than deliberately looking for God's blessings through the day and listing them to myself before I go to sleep. Falling asleep with God's goodness on my mind is a wonderful way to boost a sense of wellbeing.

In the book of Hebrews we are challenged to offer a 'sacrifice of praise' (Hebrews 13:15). Offering a sacrifice means giving something up, so what might we have to 'give up' when we offer a sacrifice of praise and worship? I would like to suggest that this sacrifice involves letting go of three things. Firstly, we surrender our

expectations of a pain-free, hasslefree life. Jesus did not promise us an easy life but rather one where we are encouraged to take up our cross and follow Him. But we are not left to carry this cross on our own - He has promised to be with us always. Secondly, we give up our desire to understand everything, instantly. It is natural to want to understand why things happen to us but sometimes this is just not possible. When we offer praise to God despite our circumstances we acknowledge that God is good and that He can bring good out of bad and that He knows the end from the beginning. Thirdly, when we offer a sacrifice of praise, we let go of our need to be in control. Sometimes we work so hard to manipulate things according to our own understanding of what would be good for us that we tend to take the reins out of God's hands. But to surrender ourselves. our circumstances, our wishes and our wants, to our loving Heavenly Father is exactly what it means to offer up a sacrifice of praise. And, strange as it may seem, it is through this pathway of sacrifice that we find the path to happiness.

Thanking God for His blessings and His provisions brings us into His presence and there we find that praise and gratitude naturally wells up within us as we are touched by His love and moved by His goodness and His grace. Having an attitude of gratitude not only benefits our health and makes us happier but it is also the fertile ground in which our relationship with God can grow and flourish. May thanks and gratitude to God, as well as praise and worship, ever be in our hearts and on our lips.

Sometimes it stood testimony to their personal failures. Christ visited it and it was there we see one of the Bible's greatest stories of personal testimony and worship...

SHECHEM

Do you know the town of Shechem? Maybe not. It isn't as well-known as Jerusalem. It isn't as famous as Damascus or as populated as Rome.

Since some trader first made his way across this rugged land there has been a town at this spot. Supposedly founded by a Canaanite warlord, it soon became a stop along the trade paths and out of that trade a town grew. In various dialects it was known as Sychem or Sikima, but the name we read about in our Bibles today is Shechem. The town dates back at least 4000 years and is mentioned in the Elba tablets and early Egyptian writings. It's old! And it witnessed so much... the personal testimonies of many of our Bible 'Greats' played out there...

ABRAM

We first see it in the Bible when Abram, believing in the Lord and following the calling of his God, made his way to this new land that had been promised him. The first place he enters is Shechem, with its great tree of Moreh. It was at Shechem that the Lord appeared to him saying, "To your offspring I will give this land."

At Shechem, Abram built an altar to the Lord (Genesis 12:6-7). This act of worship is a bold declaration of faith. The land is fully occupied by Canaanites but Abraham believes God's promise and moves forward in faith that God will give what He has promised.

We know this place remains sacred to the Patriarchs. The next time we encounter it, Jacob has just reconciled with Esau. Jacob is now the bearer of the covenant that was originally given to his grandfather. And he has just wrestled with God. He makes his way to Shechem and buys a parcel of land.

On that parcel of land he sets up an altar of his own to God. Biblical scholars also suggest this is where he builds a well to support his household while there.

I love the picture this gives us. A grandson remembering his grandfather and the promise of God and coming to that same place to build his own altar. He calls this place El Elohe Israel - Mighty is the God of Israel (Genesis 33:18-20). He can see the promise of God slowly being fulfilled.

We know the great tree of Moreh is still there at this point, because that's where Jacob will shortly bury all the family idols (Genesis 35:4). And it's this same parcel of land that will one day hold Joseph's bones (Joshua 24:32).

Moses and Joshua

We get more of an idea of where Shechem is from the Bible when Moses instructs Joshua in Deuteronomy 11. He tells Joshua that once they have entered the Holy Land, he is to proclaim blessings on Mount Gerezim, and curses on Mount Ebalthe. These mountains are across the Jordan in the west near the great trees of Moreh. [Deuteronomy 11:29-30]

We also see it is still an important spiritual place for God. It is in the same place Abram worshipped God that the Israelites are to be given a choice. And that's what happens in Joshua 24. All the tribes of Israel are assembled at Shechem and Joshua stands before them uttering those words we know so well, "Choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve".

WITNESS TO GOOD AND BAD

There have always been choices at Shechem. Not all of the choices however, were good.

Shechem was where the ruler of that town took Dinah against her will, and Jacob's sons put every man to the sword.

It was at Shechem that Abimilech spurred the people on to revolt until they proclaimed him their king (Judges 9). He reigned for three years and was driven from the city, so in anger he destroyed much of the town and sowed the land with salt.

It was rebuilt in the 10th century BC.

Shechem is where Rehoboam was king when Jeroboam revolted, leading to the split of the Hebrew tribes into Judah and Israel.

Again and again humans broke their promises at Shechem, broke their agreements with God and with each other. This place where Joshua said choose now, where Jacob bought land and built a well, and where Abraham first worshipped the Lord in Israel, was also a place of war and rebellion.

The town was attacked and rebuilt, destroyed and built up, and over the years its name evolved and changed. But there remained a town in this dry, dangerous place, and although the trade remained other cities grew and became more important, there always remained people in this place.

That is because there was one thing Jacob had built that ensured it would always be a place to stop and visit. This dusty old town, so often destroyed, knocked down, built back up, renamed again and again, still held a source of water.

A WELL.

THE well.

This same well, hundreds of years later, becomes significant again because it sees the footprint of the Saviour as He makes His way from Jerusalem to Galilee.

Now, Jesus comes to a small town in Samaria near the plot of ground Jacob had given to his son (John 4:5), under the shadow of Mount Gerezim where the Samaritans worship. The town's name is a little different, it's called Sychar now, which means drunkenness. This town is no longer great, no longer holds kings. Instead it holds drunks.

There's one approaching now in the heat of the day, a woman coming to the well, and the simple words Jesus will speak will shake her to the core.

"Everyone who drinks from the well will grow thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst."

I can't help thinking of Jesus standing in that place, near that well that Jacob built so long ago, the sun beating down, but the weight of the history of the place beating down even harder.

Because God remembers Abraham, remembers Jacob, remembers Joshua, and now, in the person of Jesus, God stands with His people under the shadow of Gerezim and brings a call to worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth. Jesus comes to redeem this drunken town where Abraham built an altar so long ago.

The woman will accept that call, because here stands One, though a stranger, who could tell her everything she ever did (John 4:29), and she will bring that town to Jesus, and many will become believers.

Maybe you remember the first time you turned to the Father. The first time you built an altar in your heart and worshipped Him.

How far have you come since then? Perhaps you have been through spiritual struggles, valiant battles. Perhaps the city of your heart has strayed from that first moment of worship, that first love.

Just as He came to Sychar with redemption, Jesus can redeem your war torn heart. He remembers that first love, He remembers that worship you gave. Just as the woman was made new and through her personal testimony brought those she knew to Jesus, we can do the same thing.

He wants to come and offer that living water again - to clean us and restore us to that worship, to that first love. He knows everything you've ever done yet the offer of living water still stands.

Let's drink deeply and then share it around...

Peter Down, a retired builder, along with members of the HRC board and Bairnsdale church people joined together in prayers of thanks to God for His leading in this project, led by Pastor Andrew Wilson and the Rev. Brenda Burney, Rector of Bairnsdale's St. John's Anglican Church.



Peter told how he had a God-given burden for drug and alcohol addicted people, wanting to build a rehab centre. After a comment from one of our church members, he came to us at the Bairnsdale church property. Andrew showed him an area that might suit. As Peter looked out from a small rise, a place he had never been before, he realised that he had seen this very view in a dream. He believes this was confirmation of God's direction in the matter.

There was much to do after that and

the local paper reported that God had opened many doors to allow the development to reach this exciting stage.

From our perspective, the project is also an answer to our prayers.

Since Bairnsdale church was blessed over twelve years ago by the acquisition of the property, we've sought God's guidance for the use of the part of the property not occupied by the church buildings, cafeteria, pastor's house, ADRA op shop, Gems 'n Jams op shop, the orchard and the mahogany plantation.

Did God want a school or a retirement village? Similar ideas were proposed; none came to fruition. Now it seems leasing to Hope Restart is the answer to how to further serve our community.

The first stage of the project is likely to be completed next year.

So we were happy that memorable Sunday afternoon, to befriend the HRC people and serve them an afternoon tea, a feature of which was a large, beautifully decorated commemorative cake made by local couple Gwen and Gordon Holloway and cut by Andrew Wilson and Peter Down.

Another great idea for people interested in health (which is just about everyone) is Dinner with a Doctor! Maybe your youth group has ideas.

Casey Church has just hosted a Dinner with Doctor Neil Nedley event at Fountain Gate Hotel in the South-Eastern suburbs. Dr Nedley has been helping people who suffer with depression and anxiety for many years now and is the founder of the DARP.

"This dinner was not a standalone event," says Pr Michael Mohanu, Casey's pastor. "As well as consolidating existing community friendships and starting new ones, it was a springboard for future events we will be running. We invited guests to participate in a DARP, CHIP or one of the other community programs we have been running for some time now. This is part of our commitment to the Great Commission, endeavouring to reach our community in new and creative ways."

And while Dr Nedley was in Melbourne last weekend, Gateway Church took advantage of his presence, with two community lectures held at Monash University. Attendees were invited to attend community talks over the next three weekends, where church members will meet and mingle with the attendees, and from there invite them to join a Care Group, where they can socialise, support each other and study God's word together.

The possibilities are endless, and as you can see collaboration between churches is possible, so give it some thought – could your church do it? Who would you like to see as your guest presenter or what theme would you like to explore? Talk it over with your pastor or contact the Harvest Victoria team and see where this could go. Yesterday, Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison delivered the National Apology to Victims and Survivors of Institutional Child Sexual Abuse at Parliament House in Canberra. The National Apology emerged from the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. According to the National Council of Churches, "The Commission is a tribute to the victims and survivors, their families and supporters. Their courage has helped create a culture of accountability and of trust in children's voices that help all of us take responsibility for keeping children safe and well."

Sadly, the Seventh-day Adventist Church has not been immune to cases of child sexual abuse. We acknowledge that children and young people have been abused, betrayed and/or ignored within our Church communities. We are deeply sorry for the harm suffered by those who have been physically, sexually or psychologically abused by church members, elders, departmental leaders, employees or volunteers in the Adventist Church.

We acknowledge our corporate failure to provide a safe environment for children, and for initiating, allowing or covering-up any form of abuse or neglect of a child or young person. It saddens us deeply that these children and young people may now have a distorted view of God and His Church.

We are also sorry for failing to protect young people from secondary abuse through our failure to listen to their story or by protecting or inadequately dealing with those who committed the abuse.

As a Church we must all work together to ensure zero tolerance for any form of physical, emotional or sexual abuse. We commit to taking all steps necessary to prevent abuse happening in any of our churches, schools, institutions, social environments or in our homes. We will continue to develop appropriate guidelines and policies that help to provide safe places for children, and to educate and train church leaders and members to demonstrate openness, honesty and integrity.



Maths Olympiad

The Maths Olympiad event was designed by teachers so that our Year Six students across Victoria could meet together annually for an academic purpose. This would also help our students see God's great and creative expressions in Mathematics as they study problems and use math to find solutions. Our recent annual event was held on WED 19 SEPT, our third Maths Olympiad for our system.



At group level, it involves five students working with their peers whom they may have not yet met from each Adventist school: Edinburgh College, Gilson College, Henderson College (who flew in for the event), Heritage College and Nunawading Christian College. Each 'mixed' group, we had ten groups this year, completed various mathematical tasks for each section of the day and to receive points based on accuracy with some time frames in place.

The tasks would include: Number and Algebra. Measurement and Geometry, and Statistics and Probability. Aligned to the Australian Curriculum. teachers also understood that this 'develops the numeracy capabilities that all students need in their personal,



work and civic life, and provides the fundamentals on which mathematical specialties and professional applications of mathematics are built', [Australiancurriculum.edu.au, 2016].

That's a great question but the real underlying question is, Why Evangelism? The answer to this question answers the first. So, here are 10 reasons why...

- 1. Jesus commands it: "Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Matthew 28:19,20 (NLT)
- 2. Evangelism connects sinners with Jesus who desires to save all from sin. This is the message of 2 Corinthians 5:19, 20: "For God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself, no longer counting people's sins against them. And He gave us this wonderful message of reconciliation. So we are Christ's ambassadors; God is making His appeal through us. We speak for Christ when we plead, "Come back to God!" (NLT)
- 3. Evangelism changes the lives of God's followers. Evangelism doesn't just positively affect those being evangelised but also those who are doing evangelism. I would go even so far as to say that at the end of the day the ones doing the work of evangelism are ones who are the most blessed.
- Evangelism is necessary because most people live in darkness. As Jesus Himself said, "I have come into the world as a light, so that no one who believes in me should stay in darkness." John 12:46 (NIV)
- 5. Evangelism is the reason for the existence of the Seventh-day

- Adventist Church. Here's how the official mission statement of the Seventh-day Adventist Church puts it: "The mission of the Seventh-day Adventist Church is to communicate to all peoples the everlasting gospel of God's love..."
- 6. If we believe that we should follow the Early Christian Church model, then evangelism is certainly going to be a priority. The Book of Acts is all about evangelism. Empowered by the Holy Spirit, the followers of Christ, at the risk and peril of their lives, went about proclaiming Jesus Christ throughout the known world.
- 7. Evangelism must take place before Jesus returns and brings to an end this world of pain and suffering. Jesus in His sermon about end-time events makes that very clear: "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come." Matthew 24:14 [KJV]
- 8. Evangelism prevents a church from becoming stale and riddled with difficulties. When a church loses its reason for existing, evangelism, it eventually becomes dull and dead. A church full of problems is probably a church that is not involved in evangelism.
- Evangelism is on God's heart. It's been on his heart ever since the Fall of Man and was powerfully revealed at the Cross. That's why Peter said, "The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as

- some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." 2 Peter 3:9 (KJV)
- 10. Why Evangelism? Because we can't help ourselves. Jesus in our hearts drives us to be involved in evangelism just as John and Peter expressed in Acts 4:20: "For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard." (NKJV) In other words, we have to we can't help ourselves.

So why train? To be more effective at doing what we must do. That is why you should participate in our upcoming evangelism training.

their families will be able to relax looking over the river enjoying a cool drink in the coming summer months



A House of Brands?

Did you know that earlier this decade, here in Australia, the Seventh-day Adventist Church had more locations than KFC? There is no question which is wider known – even though we were in this country 80 or so years before KFC was and in the 1990's the fast food chain overhauled its branding to what we now see today.

A House of Brands

Why is it that we seem incognito? Is it possible that people do not know who we are because we have not presented ourselves corporately? Everyone is on their own turf, doing their own thing... creating their own brand and image.

If you google Seventh-day Adventist Logos, it would certainly seem we have become a House of Brands. It is not surprising really. As an organisation, it was thirteen years before there was any formal structure and we value not conforming, thinking for ourselves and forging ahead. Further, given it was not until the 1990's that the General Conference released the first Global Identity package, there is no wonder there are so many different Seventh-day Adventist related logos.

It is also not surprising so many people do not know who we are and have no visual identity to associate with us.



DOES IT MATTER?

Our primary mission as a church, is to go and tell the world the Good News. So is branding and recognition all that

important? Isn't simply spreading the Gospel sufficient – it doesn't matter if the people we reach know about us or not?

Say you are on a road trip. Which motel are you going to pull into? The one with a faded half hidden and hard to read sign, or the one with a bold sign out front, simply stating they are part of a chain you recognise? Maybe even a chain you have stayed at before. Which one will you be more likely to trust?

Is recognition important?

Twenty years after the first Identity package from the GC, James Standish, at the South Pacific Division, began looking into where we were at as a Church in our region. He found that as a corporate entity, our branding was

inconsistent and, particularly here in Australia, we were incognito. With so many different signs (and this is a world wide issue) our church was a symphony of incoherence, with little to indicate that all our entities and ministries were part of the same music!

Using the road trip analogy again, you really enjoyed the motel where you stayed that first night. It was clean, had good amenities and there were a few extras that just made your stay better. Subsequent nights you looked for one from that same chain, because you now trust its standards.

But each motel within the chain had created its own unique sign indicating it was part of the bigger group and you continued driving past, oblivious to its identity. Some nights you got lucky - something caught your attention and as you slowed down, saw it was a part of the chain. Other nights you missed out on much needed rest as you proceeded to the next town. Or perhaps early on, you stopped looking, no longer trusting that motel chain's standards. There might be one or two good ones in the chain, but you figured it wasn't worth your effort.

If a person has a meaningful experience with us as a church, an experience that built some trust, that trust will be transferred to subsequent encounters and experiences with us... if they can identify who we are. And if they can trust us enough to have a relationship with us, we become part of how God will reach out to them

We have all experienced how God will use difficult times and circumstances to draw us closer to Him. It is well known that people will turn to church during difficult times. If we are incognito, how can the person who was for example, a part of our school community as a child, turn to us for help as an adult? They need to be able to easily identify the

'motel chain' they trust.

YES IT DOES MATTER!

Branding is the story you tell, perhaps while saying nothing at all. It is who people believe you are, based on their experiences with you and, in part, the image you portray. It allows transference of trust between the different components under the same brand.

But it is about far more than just recognising who we are. A consistent brand enables all the different components of our Church to work together for the greater good - for the mission Christ gave us.

The benefits are internal as well, as a consistent brand empowers us individually as we subconsciously recognise we are a part of something so global.

BECOMING A BRANDED HOUSE

We want to become known for our message of Hope and Truth through our Sola Scriptura stand. To that end, the World Church recognised that a consistent approach to branding was needed. Taking the work done by the SPD, the General Conference developed it further before passing back to the Divisions to make the final adjustments needed for their regions, before rolling it out to Unions, Conferences and local Churches.

Is your church considering new signage or developing its branding for stationary and social media? There is a time for not conforming, for taking a stand, but there is also a time where conforming will actually be for the greater good. It is our prayer that churches will get excited about this new Identity package, letting go of their small patches of creative turf for the greater good of working together to build an identity people will recognise and trust, that will become synonymous with sola scriptura and holistic hope; that each of us will work together to become a Branded House, rather than a House of Brands.




